Oxford Spring School in Advanced Research Methods

The Oxford Spring School in Advanced Research Methods will take place over 27 - 31 March 2017. Registration is now open and will close on: Monday 16 January 2017.

Programme Overview

The Oxford Spring School offers graduate students and researchers from universities across the UK and abroad a unique venue to learn cutting-edge methods in quantitative and qualitative methods in the social sciences, with a variety of advanced courses which place the different data analysis techniques within broader disciplinary trends towards mixed-methods research designs.

Course options include a choice between sets of increasingly popular and influential methods/techniques in the discipline: Social Network Analysis ; Causal Inference; Process Tracing; Forecasting; Spatial Analysis; and Data Visualisation.

Participants will be able to take a total of up to three different methods courses in one week, as well as a masterclass session on how to publish their research in peer-reviewed journals. Tutors will emphasise the mixed-methods philosophy underlying these courses, and the use of these techniques in different types of research designs.

JSPS Summer Programme 2017

The JSPS Summer Programme provides the opportunity for current MPhil or PhD students to receive a one week orientation on Japanese culture and research systems on arrival and then move to a host institution in Japan of their choice and approved by JSPS, to conduct collaborative research activities for 2 months during the summer. Eligibility: Applicants must be a British national and a current MPhil or PhD student based at a UK university or research institution at the time of application. Eligible research fields are not limited.

Application Deadline: Sunday 15th January 2017 Fellowship to take place during fixed period: 13 June to 23 August 2017.

Nine Dots Prize

The Nine Dots Prize is a new prize for creative thinking that tackles contemporary societal issues. Its heartland is the social sciences, but it welcomes entrants from all disciplines and cross-discipline thinking. Entrants are challenged to submit 3,000 word responses to a question set by the 12-strong Board – the inaugural question is 'Are digital technologies making politics impossible'? The Prize is US\$100,000, which will support the winner to write a short book expanding on their ideas to be published by Cambridge University Press in a variety of formats, including open access, meaning the book can be downloaded free of charge. It will be judged anonymously.
